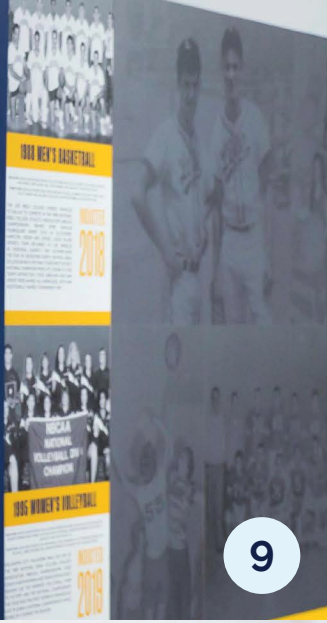

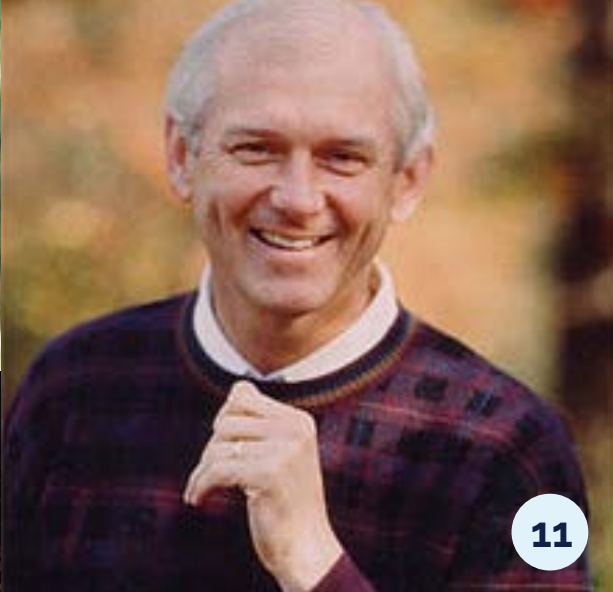

The lights are dimmed and the energy is turned up as the student-led worship team gears up to invite the presence of God into a weekly chapel service. As the music builds and the students sing, the air becomes thick with excitement and praise, and soon all in attendance are worshipping in unison.

Sitting in his office working on preparations for the coming semester, Dr. Steven Felix-Jager, chair of the Worship Arts and Media program, expresses his heart for worship and his vision for the program. "Foursquare really should be at the forefront of worship today, and we have to do our part to help — to not just be good at it, but to be innovators of it."

Part of his strategy to bring Foursquare and LPC students to the forefront of ministry includes building a symphony of professional musicians, actors, visual

artists, and instructors who, like him, will provide students with the specific, creative, hands-on training they need to succeed in their artistic, academic, and professional endeavors.

Steven and his team of ministry and entertainment professionals seek to ensure students are well-rounded in their education, as he feels that worship is a holistic experience. "We use not just the mind, but our bodies and our emotions and our thoughts - and I think it's such a powerful thing to love God in that manner," he says.

With excitement in his voice, he reflects on the significant role Sister Aimee Semple McPherson and Pastor Jack Hayford ('56) played in the artistic side of LPC's legacy. He explains, "What Jack Hayford and Aimee Semple McPherson did as far as expanding worship and creativity... they did monumental things.

He puzzled and puzzled till his puzzler was sore. Then the Grinch thought of something he hadn't before! Maybe Christmas, he thought, doesn't come from a store. Maybe Christmas... perhaps... means a little bit more!"

The late Jerry Keselburg loved the Dr. Seuss classic *How The Grinch Stole Christmas*.

Known by all who loved him as "the Grinch," Jerry was never a "mean one" like his namesake. Jerry spent his life sharing with others, especially young people who needed a bit of a nudge to get them started on the right path.

Now, through a generous initial donation of \$25,000 from Jerry's family, an endowed scholarship at Life Pacific College will continue to bless the lives of students for years to come. Best of all, as additional funds are added, the scholarship will "grow, and grow, and grow some more" much like the Grinch's heart did in the Seuss tale.

"Jerry always wanted to give back, to help those who really need the help," Pam Pearson Keselburg ('67) says of her late husband. Orphans are particularly important to Pam because she and her sister Kay (Pearson) Rozmyn were orphaned wards of the court when they were children. The sisters attended Life Pacific College in the 1960s, just like several members of Pam's family – The "Grinch" Family – who benefited from an education at Life Pacific College and now they are giving back. "That's the legacy we want to continue," says Jerry's daughter Christi Schuricht Kulonis ('91). "Just as in the story of the Grinch, a changed heart is the message we want to promote in helping people."

Generosity that Moves a Campus



Leland "Lee" Simonson went to be with the Lord on March 12, 2019 — days away from his 102nd birthday. While his life was one of service to the Lord, Lee — along with his wife Lorraine — is most well-known in the Foursquare family for his generous contribution toward facilitating the move of Life Pacific College from its original location in Los Angeles' Echo Park, where it was founded by Aimee Semple McPherson, to its current location in San Dimas, California. This strategic positioning equipped LPC to expand its campus space and subsequently the amount of students it could raise up and train for ministry as pastors, missionaries and business-as-mission workers. Today, his legacy lives on at the campus, most notably through the Simonson Center. Lee and Lorraine had four children, Larry, LeeAnn, Lavonne and Loretta, and many grandchildren.

Because of the generosity and sacrifice of Lee and those like him, Foursquare's college remains a beacon of ministry education, biblical foundations and international evangelism.

Lee was an amazing believer in Jesus...a man of great insight and wisdom... I am reminded of the conversation we had about naming the [Simonson Center] building. I felt it should be named for him since it was his generous gift that made the campus relocation possible. He resisted the idea...He was a very humble man, but was quietly influential. I finally got him to agree to this action but only if it was a Simonson family dedication. I hope every person who enters that building will pause and reflect, even if only for a few seconds, on the life of a man who loved his family, his church, missions and missionaries, LPC, and most of all his Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ.

LPC LAUNCHES FIRST SPANISH ACADEMIC PROGRAM

It is no secret that the Hispanic population in America is increasing, and with it there is an increase in the need for creative and well-trained leaders. To meet this need, Life Pacific College has added a Master of Arts in Leadership for Spanish speakers! The two-year intensive program will develop Hispanic leaders who are interested in (or already involved in) a key ministry role at a church, an executive role at an organization, or in business entrepreneurship at home or abroad. The program's online component allows students to be part of a high-quality, fully-accredited program while they continue to be actively involved in their ministry, organization or business.

Students will be fully immersed for two years in leadership theories, concepts, models and ideas, readying them for a journey into new discoveries. The program will help the students understand the value of research and writing, never forgetting the importance of praxis, specifically focused on the students' contexts. Week-long residencies help students create and maintain a robust, challenging and encouraging learning community that has potential to lead to lifelong friendships and partnerships both locally and abroad. The Master of Arts in Leadership is a truly revolutionary program in leadership, taught completely in the Spanish language, with a Christian worldview — it is an innovative step forward for Life Pacific College.

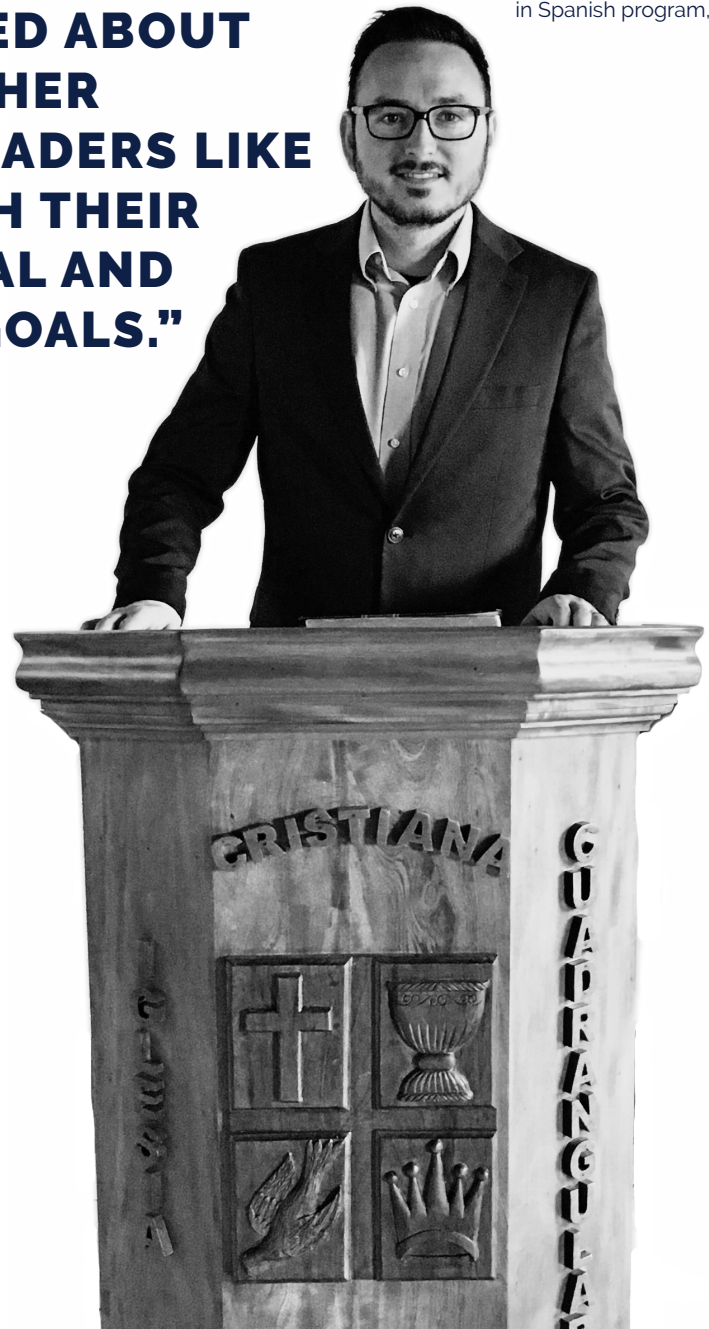
Interested students can begin applying in March of 2019 (limited availability). It is truly an exciting time! Dr. Daniel Ruarte, chair of the

LPC COMIENZA SU PRIMER PROGRAMA HISPANO

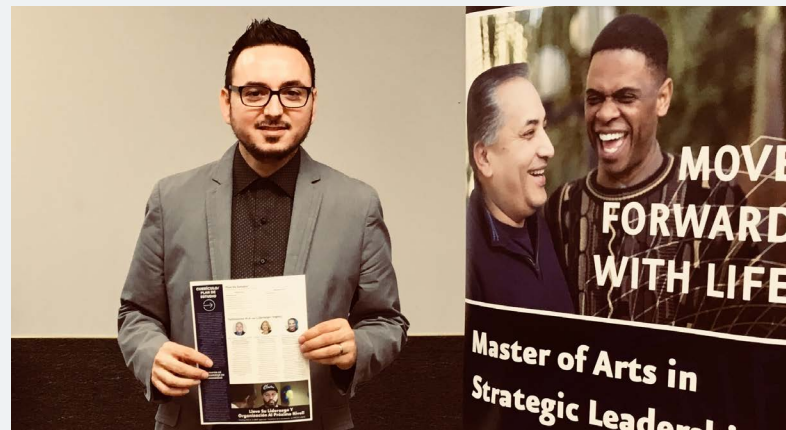

Para satisfacer esta necesidad, Life Pacific College ha añadido una Maestría en Artes en Liderazgo en español. El programa intensivo de dos años desarrollará líderes hispanos que están interesados (o ya involucrados) en un rol ministerial clave dentro de iglesia, un rol como ejecutivos en una organización, o como empresarios en EE. UU o en el extranjero. La maestría es en línea, lo que permite a los estudiantes formar parte de un programa de alta-calidad y completamente acreditado, mientras continúan participando activamente en sus ministerios, organizaciones o empresas.

Durante dos años los estudiantes estarán sumergidos completamente en teorías de liderazgo, conceptos, modelos e ideas, para llevarlos por un camino de nuevos descubrimientos y crecimiento personal. El programa les ayudara a entender el valor de la investigación y la escritura, nunca olvidando la importancia de la praxis, específicamente centrados en sus contextos. Las residencias de una semana de duración ayudan a los estudiantes a crear y mantener una comunidad de aprendizaje robusta, desafiante y alentadora que potencialmente puede crear relaciones y amistades para toda la vida. La Maestría en Artes en Liderazgo es verdaderamente un programa revolucionario en liderazgo, enseñado completamente en el idioma español, con una cosmovisión cristiana – es un paso innovador para Life Pacific College.

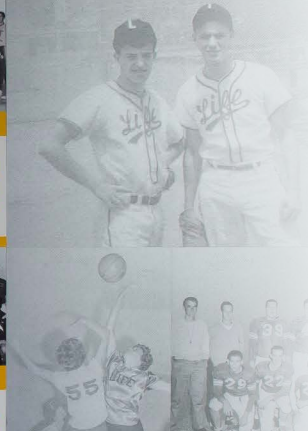

Both the day and the new space provide reminders of a deeply-rooted past and a bright future for Life Pacific's athletic program. 

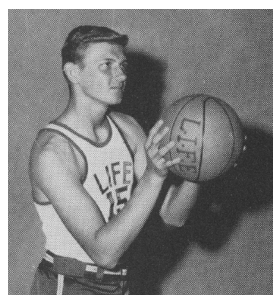

Beyond his contributions as a beloved pastor, leader, and former president of the college, Ron was an outstanding athlete during his time as a student. He was honored for his records in basketball, though he played varsity baseball, tennis, and intramural football All Stars as well.

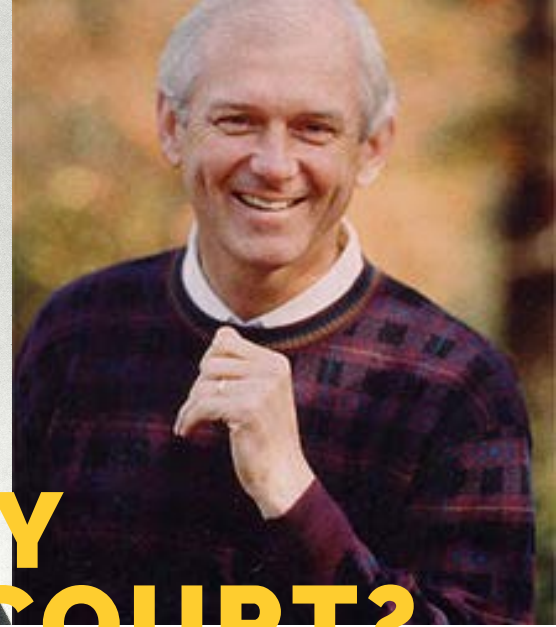
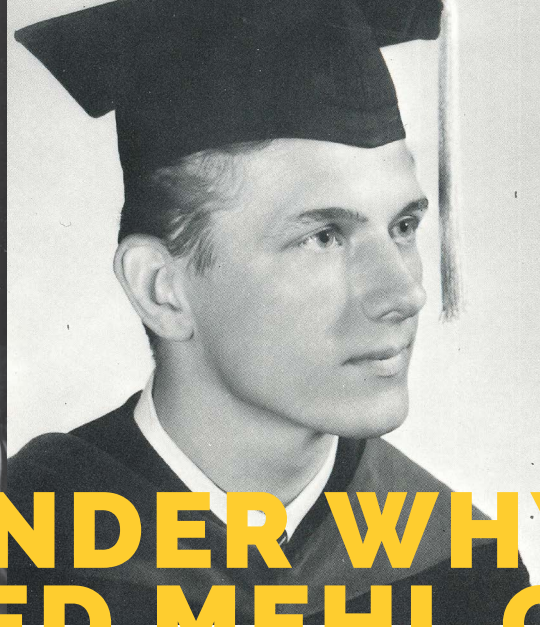
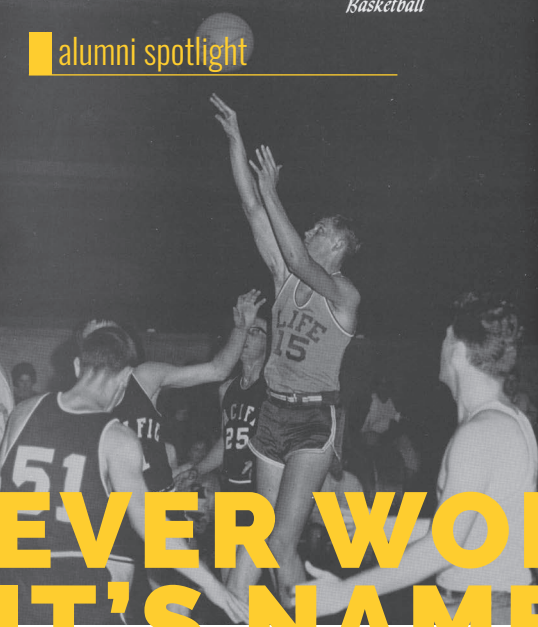

EVER WONDER WHY IT'S NAMED MEHL COURT?

The name Ron Mehl ('66) is spoken with great affection by all who knew him. Ron was a remarkable Christian leader who impacted the lives of thousands. He achieved a list of impressive credentials by any standard, yet he was remarkably humble. He had a contagious faith and generosity of spirit toward others that was instantly endearing, especially paired with the characteristic twinkle in his eye and self-deprecating joke.

Ron's beginnings were marked by selflessness.

He turned down several athletic scholarship offers at major universities to come to LPC (then L.I.F.E. Bible College) to prepare for ministry. He paid his own way through school, all while playing varsity basketball and other sports with record-breaking skill and character. When Ron eventually ran out funds to pay for tuition, he prepared to leave school, loading everything into his car to return home.

The story might have ended tragically there, were it not for the kindness of a donor. Several years prior, Dave Risser, another alumnus and basketball student-athlete, graduated and went on to become a prosperous businessman. He felt deeply moved to take all he had learned about Christian character from his basketball experiences and pay it forward to another, so he gave a generous gift to the college, asking that it be given to a basketball player. As God's timing would have it, this check was given the very same day that Ron Mehl had run out funds.

Because of the Risser scholarship, Ron was able to continue his education and graduate in 1966. He served in youth ministry and later pastored one of Foursquare's largest churches, Beaverton Foursquare Church. He became an award-winning Christian author and founded Heart of the Word radio ministry, as well as Compassion Ministries, an outreach to assist struggling young pastors and missionaries.

Ron also served as an interim president of Life Pacific College and continued to "pay it forward." He donated the proceeds of his many books to the college, enabling his alma mater to build the Hicks Student Center, which houses today's athletics program.

Current and future generations of student-athletes will continue to impact the world around them because of Ron's investment.

Though his contributions were given two decades ago, Ron's vibrant spirit and love of sports live on at Life Pacific through moments shared on Mehl Court and in the student center that he gave so generously to build.

Do we match up well with our competition? Questions like these may arise in our midst, but as the Athletics year wraps up, we as a Life Pacific community can now say that the anticipation was well worth it.

Throughout this year, Life Pacific Athletics discovered the new successes and accomplishments that come from meeting every challenge head-on! Here are just a few of the numerous highlights of our incredible athletic year:

- Jacob Brummett (MBB) and Brenna Abraham (WBB) received the Cliff Hamlow Champions of Character Award
- Alexander Nuñez (125 weight class) and Gerardo Hernandez (174 weight class) won Life Pacific's first-ever individual Wrestling Conference Championship
- Four Wrestlers qualified for the NAIA National Championship for Men's Wrestling, including Alexander Nuñez, Life Pacific's first NAIA All-American, who placed 8th
